Methodology



On behalf of SCORE, Public Opinion Strategies completed a statewide survey of 500 registered voters.

Three hundred respondents were contacted via landline and 200 via cell phone.

The survey was conducted March 29- April 1, 2019 and has a margin of error of $\pm 4.4\%$.



The State's Political Landscape


Tennesseans are very positive about the state's direction.

Governor Bill Lee begins his first term with a positive approval rating.


Do you approve or disapprove of the job Bill Lee is doing as Governor?

Verbatim Responses

Q10. What are the most important reasons why you believe that education should be the top priority?

Tennessee voters prioritize education because of the reverberating consequences of educating the next generation. Voters see education as building Tennessee's future, helping the economy, and preventing the decay of the state. As one voter puts it, Tennessee needs "a fully informed citizenry to make the best decisions about how we move forward as a society."

Tennesseans think "education is very important" because they know that they are setting up their children to handle the problems of the future. One voter thinks Tennessee needs to ensure that "everybody has a good and fair education then that can trickle into other issues." Another emphasizes that the state needs "to do a better job raising the next generation that will run our country they need to be more educated." One respondent believes that "if we can educate then other things will follow."


Q10. What are the most important reasons why you believe that education should be the top priority?

Tennessee's economy is a crucial incentive for voters' prioritizing education. Voters tie the future of the economy and the education of this generation together. Voters think "educated people can bring jobs and solve the problems that we face every day" and that "better jobs would happen."

Voters fear that current shortcomings in education will do serious harm to the population that could have been prevented. Voters believe that "if the kids don't have education they can go very easily in the wrong direction" and "if the educational needs are met, there'll be fewer problems with drugs and opioids." As one voter solemnly puts it "education is key for people to be out of poverty and clear the streets of homelessness."

And, new Governor Lee has political capital – a majority say they'd be more likely to support their State Legislator if they "support Governor Bill Lee's education policies."


Supports Governor Bill Lee's education policies.






Charter Schools

Do you have a favorable or unfavorable impression of Tennessee charter schools which are ?








Testing & Accountability


Voters continue to believe it is very important to test students.

For the first time in years, a plurality of voters believe students are given about "the right amount of tests."


And, in general, do you believe that students in Tennessee's public schools are given too many tests, about the right amount of tests, or not enough tests?



Attitudes have continued to shift on using student's academic growth as part of a teacher's evaluation.




After hearing some more information, voters favor more accountability in schools by an 81%-15% margin.

Supports measuring the academic progress of students through annual testing.






TN Ready

TN Ready is a end of year test to better assess what a child learns in a school year. It was designed to better match what is actually being taught in Tennessee classrooms. The T-N Ready test is designed to measure problem solving, critical thinking, and other skills needed for twenty-first century careers. It is the only test required by the state for all students in grades 3 through 12.

Voters continue to favor using TN Ready...


Knowing this, do you favor or oppose using TN Ready in Tennessee schools?





...Regardless of partisanship or region.


Knowing this, do you favor or oppose using TN Ready in Tennessee schools?









After High School

Almost every Tennessean believes it's important for the state to expand career and technical education to help prepare students.






Nearly 90% of voters believe Governor Lee's new initiatives to improve college and job readiness for high school students should be a high priority.
